Burning footsteps

You would think His feet would have burned the ground wouldn't you? Surely His foot-prints would be all over Israel leaving permanent marks on the rocks and perhaps even on Lake Galilee (and Egypt where he'd learned to walk). We'd be able to follow in the literal footsteps of Jesus ... If that seems fanciful in the extreme then consider this: the God who created our vast and ever expanding universe, where the light from stars travelling at 670 million miles per hour takes years to reach us, walked this planet for some 30 years. He was utterly human and completely divine.

This is the heart of Christmas, the glory of astronomical proportions, God's Son living among us, born to a human mother, cared for by a human stepfather. Somehow, the glory of God was concealed within him until his last three years when glimpses shone out in his healing and preaching, until revealed in the Cross and Resurrection.

Sometimes we are deeply moved by the thoughtful generosity of family or friends at Christmas. The conventional words "you shouldn't have" take on a deeper meaning and what we want to say is "I really don't deserve kindness on this scale" or "I can't imagine what I can possibly do to say thank you".

It's easier to deal with the tree and the tree-lights, than to contemplate what God has done for us. It's easier to think up the present for that hard-to-buy-for relative than to come to terms with the meaning of the Incarnation. But do it all the same. Maybe you'll find it difficult to frame the thoughts, let alone speak the words but do it anyway. Take time to receive that gift of wonder and delight and mystery. Best of all, you don't have to wait until Christmas for this gift. It can be yours at any time.

If you've enjoyed the gift, why not introduce someone to the giver? Christmas is the idea time to invite someone or some people to church. We will sing and speak the message of the incarnation as clearly as we can but only you can make the invitation.

Meanwhile I'll get back to the idea of His footsteps burned into the landscape.

Coffee, Tea and Cakes




Our coffee mornings are normally at Christ Church from 10am to 12 noon on the first Saturday of every month.

Gather Round

face the Magistrates!



Peter Spencer JP and Gladys Cummings JP first came in April to give a talk titled 'Magistrates in the Community'. They explained how one becomes a Magistrate, the rigorous training involved in doing this, what the role involves, the sort of criminal and civil cases that take place in the Magistrates' Court and what their powers of sentencing are: Magistrates can impose a maximum length of incarceration of 6 months for a single offence, but they do have many powers for sentences in the community and have powers to compel people to have treatment, e.g. therapy or addiction treatment, or to wear an ankle tag to prove that they are following the terms imposed on them. They also explained how in the Magistrates' Court there is a bench of 3 Magistrates overseeing each case in a courtroom and one of the Magistrates will have undertaken further training to become the Chairman of the bench.

In October Peter and Gladys were accompanied by a colleague who they are training up to do these talks in future. This meeting was about Magistrates in the Family Court. Unlike in the Magistrates' Court the Family Court is not set up like a traditional adversarial court room: normally it is held around a big table.

In many private cases, for example after a divorce, the parties involved will have been through mediation before a case gets this far, it's normally better to get a decision on which everyone can agree rather than the Court deciding it for them.

The Family Court also makes decisions regarding child welfare, whether it's getting parents help to look after their children, protecting children from abusive guardians, taking children into care when there are no other options, or deciding on whether adoption is the best outcome and who would become the right adopted parent for the child. The Magistrates explained how tough it can be to make the best decision for the child, and how they have to take many issues into account. It was a fascinating evening.

Gather Round try to give a donation to speakers when they have been to talk to us and on this occasion it was passed on to the charity HACRO - who work to improve the care and resettlement of offenders in the community. They have a Small Grants scheme that is used to give small grants to offenders to help them to move forward from a life of crime in such aspects as gaining qualifications and achieving employment, so hopefully they will not end up before the Courts again.

Our next meeting will be our Christmas Social on December 13th, when we bring a little food to share, get to know each other better and, hopefully, to organise our meetings for 2017.

Any woman who would like to join us would be very welcome.

KWA MKONO NEWS October 2016

Keith and Lesley, two of our trustees, have just returned from their annual visit to the disabled children's centre. This year Norman Allen joined them to see what happens at the centre.

He explains: "It was after Lesley and Keith heard that I had been to Tanzania earlier this year that they asked me if I would like to go back only this time with them so as to help with the work that they have been doing over the past 11 years at the Centre. February 2016 was when I went on safari; September 2016 was another adventure, only this time a completely different one.



The main job during my stay was to assist with the building of a new Chicken House; it was just like old times except that I had not ventured into Chicken House building before. A local bricklayer and his son removed the old house, dug out the footings and commenced laying the bricks "sort" of to my drawing. I should tell you here that as there were a pile of bricks left on the football pitch from a previous project, it was decided that they should be moved to within the reach of the new site. No sooner had Keith and I started over came the lads, one on crutches and others on their wooden wheeler trikes which they loaded up and took across for us. I was at the loading end whilst Keith was at the stacking

end. You have never seen a more willing bunch of lads, maybe the carrot that Keith had dangled in front of them had something to do with it as he told them that once the bricks were moved they would be able to get their football pitch back, and we played that afternoon.

You need to witness for yourself just how wonderful these disabled children are. On one occasion I was playing football with the lads, plus with a typical African football, plastic bags all crammed into a bag and tied up with string and tape. On my side I had one lad who only had one arm and leg but boy could he manoeuvre himself plus score goals. All the lads have some kind of disability including one with no legs below the knee, so they remove their false limbs and shuffle around on their backsides and use their fists to hit the ball. I think that the biggest surprise was when I saw one of the opposition come dribbling the ball towards me and he was on a pair of crutches. Each and every one of them had their own problem but none of them let that get in the way and boy were they competitive even to shoulder charging the guy on crutches. After an hour of running around on their African "Wembley" pitch, I have to admit that I was relieved to see the ball go over the boundary fence of the neighbouring hospital; it was my chance to pop off for a welcome cup of tea. I had lost count of the score but nobody seemed to care as they were all having fun. I will not forget my time at the Centre, the gratitude that the staff and children showed towards us was quite amazing and now they tell me that my name is on the Chicken House door, fame at last. A part of their thank you was when they put on a show and a dinner for us before we had to leave, that was very special and will always remain a very happy memory for me. Knowing Lesley and Keith as well as I do I can assure you that ALL of the donations sent to this charity do go to the Disabled Children's Centre and we paid all of our own expenses to do this trip, and it was worth every Tanzanian Shilling." --- Norman

This year the centre looked very different the new fence and gates give a neater and well cared for look to the front. As soon as you come through the gate the building that faces you (and used to have the kitchen at one end and mini class at the other) is transformed by making the whole building into a hall the windows have been enlarged with new modern grills to let in light and air. The new hall allows all the children to eat together and there is room for visitors to join them. The moving of the kitchen to a purpose built building with stoves that have chimneys and use wood efficiently is a big improvement reducing the smoke that



drifted across the centre. The Trust gives thanks to Polio Children for Norman with the boys after the football game their help by funding these improvements.

The chicken's numbers have increased to over 125 and there are also a few ducks. To stop the newly hatched chicks being taken by the magpie type birds and the local cats, the `Norman chicken house' has been built, it will have a run covered with a wire roof so they are safe from predators.

....contd. The centre intend to increase chicken numbers to 200 then start to sell eggs and chickens as well as using some for the children. Vegetables are being grown using recycled washing water, there is enough for the centre but the shortage of rain water means that although they planted extra it has not matured and cannot be sold to raise badly needed income.

Watford Fairtrade Town Tenth Anniversary March 2017

10 years ago Watford Borough Council, Faith groups, Shops, Cafés, Businesses, Schools, the Media and Community Groups all contributed to our Campaign to become the 250th Fairtrade Town in the UK. We satisfied the Fairtrade Foundation's Five Goals and were declared a Fairtrade Town on 5 March 2007 in Watford Museum.

By joining the ranks of Fairtrade Towns across the UK we contributed to the benefits of the Fairtrade System to over a million farmer producers in the Developing World, who were supported and guaranteed a sustainable future. The numbers of producers have increased to 1.6 million and with their families there are about 8 million people able to live 'normal' lives.

Families across Africa, Asia, South America and the Pacific can now put food on their tables, send their children to school and access clean water and health-care on a regular basis.

Watford Fairtrade Steering Group is asking that as many people as possible will recognise the Tenth Anniversary celebrations in Fairtrade Fortnight 2017. The dates are 27 February to 12 March 2017. Churches can celebrate Pancake Night, 28 February, using many Fairtrade fillings such as pineapple chunks, sugar, honey, lemon juice, hazel-nut spread, jams, peanut butter, bananas, marmalade and many others all available as Fairtrade products.

There are about 4500 Fairtrade products available in UK but ones such as gold wedding rings, cotton wool, cotton clothing, rubber products, cosmetics and footballs are not really suitable for filling a pancake!
