KwaMkono Disabled Children's Trust are celebrating 50 YEARS HELPING DISABLED CHILDREN



It was in 1969 that Sister Magdalena CSP realised that the number of children disabled by polio in the Kwa Mkono area needed a hostel so that sisters could

continue the work they had been doing rehabilitating the children and educating them in the bedded dispensary. Sister Magdalena took over the nurses' accommodation that had just become vacant (a new nurses home having just opened). She applied to the district government for permission to open a children's home and applied for funding from the UK and started the building of the Polio Hostel.

The sisters admitted children with a physical disability who could be helped by having an orthopaedic operation, physiotherapy to improve their mobility and education or training in a trade to enable them to live independently when they leave. Hundreds of children have passed through the hostel in the 50 years and there are dozens of children who went on to college and have become teachers, accountants and bookkeepers working around the country. Those who were not academic have been trained at the hostel and are now working as carpenters, tailors and shoe makers. Since the early 2000's the polio vaccine had reduced the number of children becoming disabled from polio, so the hostel widened the range of disabilities it could help, changing its name to the Kwa Mkono Disabled Children's Centre



In July the trust celebrated 10 years since it was registered as a charity. In that time it has improved the diet of the children, ensured the staff are paid regularly and updated the buildings by putting new roofs on the dormitories and painting them inside and out.

The trust has also raised money or found sponsors to improve the facilities at the centre. There is a new kitchen with fuel efficient stoves and the size of the hall has been doubled so all the children can eat together. Solar lighting has been installed in the dormitories and a capped bore hole opened and a bowser purchased so the centre and hospital have a guaranteed water supply.

Two trustees have just returned from the Centre. As usual there is good news and not so good. The vegetable gardens in the Centre grounds are being increased, there is a volunteer who has agreed to teach the children how to manage and look after vegetables: his name is Edward. The children are very interested in helping him and we have made sure that there are plenty of seeds and tools for the children.

The shamba (farm) is not doing very well: the rains are not coming as they should and therefore cause drought conditions, the maize, peas and beans have not produced much harvest but the cassava is alright and can be used for food for children and it is hoped that the quality is good enough to be sold to the biscuit factory, bringing in much needed funds.

We are very close to reaching our target for purchasing a Land Cruiser. The Diocese has raised about £3,000 which is nearly £10,000 short of their target, with sponsors helping we have raised our target plus a little extra so we are trying to raise more funds. The good news is that the District Commissioner has agreed for the exemption of Import and tax duties saving us \$11,000.

We will be selling calendars for £8.00 each +£2.00 p&p which give pictures from the Centre and a small explanation. These are available from 20th October.

We are still pleased to say all donations are used to benefit the children as we are all volunteers and we also pay our own costs for visiting the Centre.

The children and staff thank all those who support the centre through Kwa Mkono Disabled Children's Trust.

We regret to inform you that Sue Pankhurst died suddenly on Tuesday Sept 10th.

Sue was a brilliant colleague who wore her considerable learning and experience lightly, whether that was from her work as a physiotherapist or as a Church of England Reader. There was a lot there but she simply didn't show it off. It was only if you were able to work with her that you discovered the depth of her knowledge and experience, as well as her skills with people whether one to one, or in leading worship.

Sue was a good leader but one able to lead by encouragement and with humility as well. It wasn't about her but about God and the people she was serving. She worked hard too, whether in preparation or delivery.

Sue's busy life included a strong commitment to the Talking Newspaper for the Blind - helping to record many editions over the years, using her skills in physiotherapy and in listening to people at the Peace Hospice, acting as chaplain at the Ambulance station, and supporting the work of Churches Together in North Watford and Garston for whom she was to have been moderator from later this year. Sue was also a busy mother and latterly grandmother.

Sue's most public role was as a member of our team of Readers at Christ Church and St Mark's, often leading worship or preaching. Sue put a lot of time into preparing sermons and her effort showed at its best in what was to be her last but perhaps best sermon on Children and Church.

Sue also ministered to the residents of Courtlands Lodge by taking communion to them every month. What wasn't so public nor so easy to quantify was the precious time Sue spent listening to people and being alongside them during tough times.

Sue took a key role in launching Messy Church as a new initiative here. Sue was an important member of our planning team as well as taking her turn to lead and deliver Messy Church sessions. She was also heavily involved with our children & families outreach project (Lift Off) from its beginnings seven years ago. Not content just to sit on a committee, Sue willingly joined the other volunteers who operate our children's clubs. She was already well involved, but to help cover maternity leave Sue simply got stuck in and did extra sessions wherever someone was needed.

Sue's calling as a Reader had led her to becoming Deanery Readers Advisor about two years ago. This meant supporting other Readers, interviewing people thinking about Reader ministry, raising the profile of Reader ministry and Sue had planned to go to every church in Watford deanery to preach about Reader ministry over the next 12 months.

Just two days before she died Sue preached a brilliant sermon on Children and Church, twice of course, at St Mark's and at Christ Church. It was well prepared, clear and enthusiastic. This was Sue, ministering right to the end and that is how some of us at least will remember her. We will miss Sue but we will not let our sadness stop us continuing the work which was so close to her heart.

Sue's funeral services were packed: both at the crematorium and at Christ Church. This showed the respect and affection in which Sue was held by so many. As one person said: "I was due to be away on the day of her funeral, but I cancelled it. There are only a handful of people for whom I would do that, and most of those are family." That says it all.

HARVEST FESTIVAL

Our Harvest Festival service was held at Christ Church on 29th September.

Donations of food were brought: tins and packets for the Food Bank and fresh food for the New Hope Trust.

Cash donations of nearly £300 were collected for Christian Aid. After the service, we enjoyed a "Bring and Share" lunch.



Keith has served as Reader at Christ Church and St Mark's for 54 years. In the early years, his work was mainly at St Mark's, but ever since a change of incumbent in the 1970s, he has ministered at both churches and elsewhere in the Parish.


